## CHAIR'S REPORT

Welcome back after a hot and relaxing summer. When you consider that we have had no hurricanes, no wars and a continued designation as the best place to live in Canada, we have a lot to be thankful about.

The College has moved to new premises. The new office is easily accessible to the public and registrants, located on West Broadway. The office is on a major bus route as well as being easily accessible by car or by foot. The Board made a decision to move the office following numerous complaints of how difficult the Richmond office was to find and that it was not accessible by public transport. The new office is in a professional building and located within walking distance of many of the other regulatory agencies. Surprisingly, the rent is cheaper than the Richmond office. Board and committee meetings are held on the premises.

I remind registrants that College meetings are open to the public. The Board believes that by relocating to a more convenient location it will encourage an increased attendance at these meetings. Also, I would remind registrants of the opportunity to have the Board listen to the concerns of the profession; you may apply in writing for an appointment to address the Board. The Board will accept such requests based on public interest, the importance of the issue and the number of persons it affects

During the summer the Board of the College has responded to a series of requests from the Minister of Health Services Colin Hansen. Following a March 30th 2004 announcement on increases to the scope of practice of opticians and optometrists, the Board has worked to fulfill obligations created by the proposed changes. Changes to the Opticians Regulations will allow opticians to assess a person's visual needs and change eyeglasses based on the assessment. The changes will allow an optician to perform this function without the oversight of an optometrist or a physician.

The announced change caused a significant response from the optometric community. The opticians groups have responded in a professional manner to the challenges presented by the misleading information circulated by some groups. I would like to congratulate the various spokespersons on their effective and courteous manner in which they represented the opticians' community. The changes to the Regulations are still not in effect. Until such time as the new Regulations are proclaimed, opticians must continue to follow the existing Standards of Practice. Specifically, opticians may only use the results of an automated sight test provided the results of the test are transmitted to an optometrist or a physician. An optician may only

dispense corrective eyewear on a prescription from an optometrist or physician.

Many opticians have contacted the College office about the Mandatory Continuing Education program. Enclosed with this Newsletter, is a Question and Answer sheet that answers many of your concerns. As well the College web site <http://www.cobc.ca> has detailed information on the program. Specific information on the availability of courses may be obtained directly from the Dispensing Opticians Association of British Columbia or the Opticians Association of Canada. The contact information for these professional organizations is listed below.

Some opticians have expressed concern that they have been unable to obtain patient information from some other health professionals. Typically registrants report they are having difficulty getting prescriptions from some service providers. The College recommends registrants use the form "Authorization to Release Personal Information" in such situations. A copy of the document is available on the College website <http://www.cobc.ca> the form conforms to the Personal Information Protection Act. To avoid unprofessional confrontation, use this form when you request prescription information from a prescriber. If you continue to have difficulty with the transfer of the information, contact the College office.

## OPTICIANS REGULATIONS ON SIGHT TESTING AND OUT-OF-PROVINCE PRESCRIPTIONS

You are aware that the Minister of Health recently announced that the Opticians Regulations will be amended to allow opticians to provide sight-testing services to healthy adults using automated sight testing equipment. Until the new regulations come into force registrants must adhere to the existing standards.

- Opticians must ensure that the client signs a consent form that states they understand the difference between a sight test and an eye health exam.
- To protect people for whom an eye health exam is necessary before glasses can be safely prescribed, opticians are not permitted to perform sight tests on the following:
  - Individuals under 19 or over 65
  - Individuals with specific medical conditions that may cause disease of the eye
  - Individuals with certain categories of eye prescriptions
- Opticians must transmit the result of the sight test to a prescriber who may issue a prescription.
- Opticians may only dispense eyeglasses and contact lenses on the prescription of a prescriber.

Each registrant has a copy of the standards of practice of the College; opticians are obligated to follow these standards.

## WHAT HAPPENS IF AN OPTICAL STORE IS CONDUCTING BUSINESS WITHOUT A REGISTRANT?



The titles of Dispensing Optician and Contact Lens Fitter are protected titles that may only be used by members of the College of Opticians of British Columbia. A person other than a registrant of the College may not perform any of the services of dispensing eyeglasses and contact lenses unless he or she does so under supervision and in compliance with the Regulations and By Laws of the College. If an inspector believes that a person other than a registrant has contravened the *Health Professions Act*, the Regulations or the Bylaws, the inspector may apply to the Supreme Court for an order to inspect the business. The College inspectors continue to have legislative authority without court order to inspect the premises, equipment and materials used by a registrant. The inspector may also examine files relating to the registrants practice as well as observe the practice of the registrant or a person working under the supervision of the registrant.

## SUMMARIES OF INQUIRY UNDERTAKINGS AND CONSENT ORDERS

### 1. Sight Testing without adhering to Section 8 of the Standards of Practice

It came to the attention of the College that an optician was not establishing and maintaining a consistent system for recording and filing relevant client information for sight testing clients. The Inquiry Committee of the College investigated the matter and found the member to be in contravention of the Standards of Practice of the College of Opticians. The Inquiry Committee resolved the matter by acting under Section 36 of the Health Professions Act.

### 2. Sight Testing without adhering to Section 8 of the Standards of Practice

It came to the attention of the College that an optician was not adhering to restrictions and not completing client files for sight testing clients. The Inquiry Committee of the College investigated the matter and found the member to be in contravention of the Standards of Practice of the College of Opticians. The Inquiry Committee resolved the matter by acting under Section 36 of the Health Professions Act.

### Have you Considered Study Groups to Complete the MCE Requirement?

You do not need to rely on professional associations and product suppliers to complete your continuing education requirements. Study clubs are an effective way of fulfilling the MCE requirements. It's simple: contact several colleagues in your immediate area. Select a topic – this can be drawn from a professional publication or from pre approved material from one of the professional associations (obtain approval from the sponsoring organization). Please watch for an application for approval of a study club program to be posted on the College website ([www.cobc.ca](http://www.cobc.ca)) in the MCE section.



## MCE Questions and Answers:

### **Where do I find information about the MCE program?**

Check the College webpage at <http://www.cobc.ca>, enter the Registrant Access and scroll to the Mandatory Continuing Education section. You will see files including Guidelines and MCE Credit Application Forms. There is also a section titled "Where to get Your Mandatory Continuing Education Credits". This section lists approved sponsors of MCE courses. Please contact the sponsors directly for information on course dates and credit allocations.

### **When do I send my credits to the College office?**

As you collect your credits, file them somewhere safe until your due date. When your credits become due, complete the MCE Credit Submission Form, attach your credits and mail it to the College. Always keep a copy for yourself.

### **How do I break down my credits on the MCE Credit Submission Form?**

Your credits will be identified as either EG (eyeglasses), CL (contact lenses), EC (eyeglasses and contact lenses), and RF (related fields). Professional Service credits are listed on the Application for Approval of 'Other' Credits Form. You must complete this form in order to claim Professional Service credits. Professional Service credits will be allocated as appropriate.

### **I am a Dispensing Optician. Can I get credits for contact lens courses?**

You can apply contact lens credits as RF (related fields) credits. Dispensers, as an example, require seven credits per year. As long as you have a minimum four EG credits, the remaining three may come from related fields.

### **What is the difference between a Professional Provider and an Approved Related Organization?**

Sponsors of MCE courses have been divided into two groups, Professional Providers and Approved Related Organizations. They are listed separately on the College website.

1. Professional Providers include Accredited Opticians Education Programs, Optical Associations, and Approved Specialty Groups. A minimum of 70% of your credits must be supplied by these groups.
2. Approved Related Organizations include frame and lens manufacturers, other health organizations, night-school courses, etc. A maximum of 30% of your credits may be supplied by these groups.

### **How can I claim credits for a course that has not been pre-approved?**

You may apply for credits individually for courses that have not been pre-approved by the College. Bring a copy of the 'Application for Continuing Education Credit' form (available on the College website) and have this form completed by the sponsor. Submit the form and supporting documents to the College for a review and credit allocations.

### **How can the same course, presented by the same organization, sometimes qualify as a "Professional Provider" credit and sometimes as an "approved related organization" credit?**

When a 'Professional provider' invites related organization to present courses, the credits are classified as Professional provider credits. When the same related organization presents the same course independently, it is classified as an approved related organization credit.

### **Does the College publish any information on where to find courses?**

No, the College only lists approved sponsors. Registrants must contact the sponsors directly for further information.

### **What does "Other Credits" mean and how do I get them?**

'Other Credits' are listed on the 'Application for Approval of Other Credits' form found on the College website. Other credits include AGM attendance, board and committee members, including other optical associations. A form must be completed in order to claim credits.

### **I supervise non-registrants at my place of work. Am I able to claim credits for doing that?**

Only if you supervise a student that is registered with the College. Refer to the 'Application for Approval of Other Credits' and you will note that the sections for supervision of eyeglass dispensing and contact lens dispensing require a student name and dates.
